Materials List

We will be learning and practicing the basics of enameling: enamel properties, metals, sifting and firing. We will cover basic decorative techniques like sgraffito, stencils, foil, wet-packing, torch-firing and raku. This is a hands-on class and we will go at the pace of the class. I recommend holding off on getting anything until after the first class where I will demonstrate and go over the list.

Materials/ Supplies:

- Apron or old shirt
- copper sheet in the range of 22- 18 gauge- it shouldn't be any thinner than 22 to start. Remember we can always make metal thinner but not thicker. You can purchase precut shapes from Thompson Enamels or Metalliferous (online) and a limited number from Lonnie's if you do not want to cut your own. You can cut discs or squares in the studio
- Dust mask (I like the 3M N-95 but any one will do)
- 20-18g Copper sheet or pre-cut copper shapes
- Enamels- You will need to supply most of your own enamels. The studio has a supply of clear, white and black and a few other colors to get started with. You can order enamels from Thompson or purchase a jar or 2 locally at Lonnie's. Bring extra airtight containers to trade colors with fellow students if you like. Remember, this is a learning class so unless you have a specific project in mind, any 2-3 colors will work for getting the techniques down.
- Large/ Medium brush with a pointed tip (a "China" or calligraphy style brush is my favorite)
- Smaller brushes- sable is considered best but anything is fine to start as long as the bristles come to a point
- Paper and pencil/pen for note taking and designing
- Scrapbooking punches of varying designs for stencils (if you have them)
- Any little (2oz or less) airtight containers you might like to bring to trade enamels
- Jeweler's saw blades for cutting copper shapes if you plan to cut your own (we have frames and bench pins)
- Mica ~4x4, 4x6 or 6x6" (can be purchased in the studio or from the supplier's below)
- 18- 20g fine silver sheet is optional and I don't recommend it until you have worked with the enamel for a while on copper
- Fine tweezers
- Small painting tray with concave depressions- round shapes are better
- Any jewelry tools you have such as pliers and files. We have pliers and a limited number of files available.
- Magnification such as an Optivisor
